


# ON THE TREADED PATH

After leading the field at the end of third round in Gujarat Kensville Challenge, Rahil Gangjee finds himself on a familiar path

It was not the road not taken, but the beaten track that Rahil Gangjee found himself after taking a stroke lead on the penultimate round in Gujarat Kensville Challenge on Saturday. At Kensville Golf and Country Club, Rahil had a tumultuous one-over for the day but still managed to hold on to the lead at six-under.

Under windy conditions, US' Dodge Kemmer and Maximilian Kieffer of Germany shot two-under for the day to be tied second, at five-under.

However, it was seasoned Phillip Archer of England who tamed the conditions with four-under for the day to position himself for his fourth Challenge Tour title.

## INDIAN CHALLENGE

The mind, however, reverberated with the thoughts of two golfers who led

the Indian charge at the tournament. And at the end of the final round, they found themselves in a familiar territory.

Shiv Kapur faltered, a story that has

often been repeated across the nations, when he needed to hold on. Perhaps it was the wind, perhaps it was the pressure but the effect was telling, as usual.

After holding on too far for the first seven hole, Kapur double bogeyed the eighth but handed the lead to Gangjee despite a birdie in the ninth.

Gangjee, on the other hand, also had a par front nine with three birdies and equal number of bogeys.

## TURNING POINT

The equation changed in the back nine, where Gangjee shot a birdie in the 15th before hitting a bogey and double in the next two hole. Gangjee, however, ended the day on a high with a birdie in the final hole.

Pressure was eminent as Kapur struggled with the wind and hard greens. He went on to bogey the 11th, 13th and 14th to fall behind. The double bogey at the 18th symbolised what

is common in these days – failing to live up to his own high standards.

## THAT FAMILIAR FEELING

It won't be the first time that Gangjee will be leading the field going into the final round. In recent past, he was leading the field at the European Tour's Avantha Masters in 2010 and Nationwide Tour's Albertsons Boise in 2011.

However, since Volkswagen Masters-China, in his rookie Asian Tour year in 2004, Gangjee is yet to register a win outside the country.

A man with unflustered approach to the game, Gangjee invokes golf legend Jack Nicklaus as he seeks to break the jinx.

"I know what it is to be in the lead on the last day of a tournament. Many top players suffered the same fate. But I have learnt from it," Gangjee said at the end of the day.

"As Jack Nicklaus puts it: 'Have fun



and learn to become comfortable being uncomfortable'," he shared his mantra.

## KEY TO SUCCESS

While very few will admit to pressure, the 33-year-old seems to have no qualms about it. "Of course, there will be nervousness. I am a little nervous too," he said, adding, "it is only natural when you are in the lead."

It is this nervousness that Gangjee will be looking to overcome, as he seeks to break his title drought.

## Niraj, Siddharth shine for CBC Ahmedabad

Good all-round show by CBC Ahmedabad helped them thrash Kheda by a huge margin of 171 runs in
